# ADVISING

## Individual Advising

Students are strongly encouraged to meet with their faculty advisor before registering for classes and if you have an advising hold, only your advisor can lift the hold once you have met with them. Drop by your advisor's office to sign up for an advising appointment time. Advisors will reach out with their Please be on time for your appointment and review the HSS "Advising Syllabus" you received over email. If you are unsure who your advisor is, open your student account in PAWS and check the right-hand column under ADVISOR.



## PREPARING FOR YOUR ADVISING APPOINTMENT

Before meeting with your advisor, review the HSS Advising Policy and your advising syllabus to know what is expected of you. Print and bring with you the following items to your meeting:

1. A tentative schedule of classes for Fall 2019
2. Your unofficial transcript from PAWS
3. Your academic requirements as listed on PAWS

**\*\*Remember that you must meet the following minimum grade requirement in the foundation courses before you may register for department core courses. You may register for core courses if you are currently enrolled in foundation courses, but be advised that your grades will be reviewed before the fall semester and if you do not meet the grade minimums, you will be de-registered from SOC301 or SOC302.**

## Summer 2019 Course Offerings

### **SOC101: Introduction to Sociology with Dr. Clydesdale**

Summer Session 1 (mini session): May 28, 2019 — June 14, 2019

This is a blended class with most course activities taking place online with once-a-week in person class meetings on Wednesdays 10:30-3pm (with a short lunch break)



### **ANT171: Contemporary Japan with Dr. Didi-Ogren**

Summer Session 1 (mini session): May 28, 2019 — June 14, 2019

This course takes place completely online

This course is an interdisciplinary survey course that does not require any knowledge of Japanese. Students will learn about Japanese culture, establish connections with other disciplines such as history, sociology, film studies, and literature, and gain a nuanced understanding of the social practices and expectations of native speakers of different varieties of Japanese within their own speech communities.

# FALL 2019 SPECIAL TOPICS COURSE

## ANT/SOC 370—Anthropology/Sociology of Aging (Dr. Connie Kartzoz)

The purpose of this course is to explore the field of gerontology and the impact of expanded lifespans on our global society. Increasing longevity has changed the basic structure of society around the globe, with several countries now experiencing a population comprised of equal numbers of young and old and declining birth rates. This course explores the state of the science in longevity and aging and its impact on families and societies. Topics include healthcare, intergenerational relationships, caregiving, legal policy and ageism. Students will explore readings, lectures, field trips and current media to inform discussion about the challenges and opportunities for societies with an increasing percentage of older adults. Impact on family, healthcare, social structure, social policy, business, and intersections with technology will be discussed. This course will challenge students to confront their own views of aging and consider the ethical dilemmas surrounding societal care of the aged as a vulnerable population.



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## Faculty News

We are so happy to welcome back **Drs. Borland and Gazley** from year-long sabbaticals. Fall 2019 will mark the first time since Fall 2017 that the all of our full time instructors will be back on campus teaching!

Additionally, we welcome **Dr. Connie Kartzoz** from the Department of Nursing who will be teaching SOC/ANT 370 Sociology/Anthropology of Aging for us (see above!). In an unprecedented faculty swap, Dr. Rachel Adler, who recently earned her MS in Nursing, will be teaching one course for nursing students.

We are also excited to welcome **Dr. Ted Cohen** who will be teaching **SOC 310 Urban Youth Deviance**, a course we haven't offered since Fall 2016 (!). Dr. Cohen is the current Sociology Department Chair from Ohio Wesleyan University but will be retiring and relocating to the area. Ohio's loss is our gain!

Lastly, we are beyond thrilled that **Dr. George Leader** will be back for Academic Year 2019-2020 as a full-time Visiting Assistant Professor of Anthropology. George will continue his work with the Arch Street research project and teach cool anthropology courses.
