## Welcome to New Colleagues



Dr. Nuwan Jayawickreme Visiting Scholar, Psychology, Spring 2020, is an associate professor of psychology and director of the Peace and Justice Studies program at Manhattan College in Riverdale, NY. He received his Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from the University of Pennsylvania in 2010 and was a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Pennsylvania Perelman School of Medicine for 2 years before joining Manhattan College in 2012. His research focuses on cultural models of posttraumatic stress disorder and major depressive disorder, predictors of psychological well-being in populations affected by war, cross-cultural assessment of psychological constructs, and the construct validity of posttraumatic stress disorder. During his time at TCNJ, he will be collaborating with Dr. Chu Kim-Prieto (Psychology) on a mixed-methods study that aims to identify local systems of meaning in survivors of the Sri Lankan civil war. He will also be co-editing a special issue of Asian-American Journal of Psychology, the editor-in-chief of which is Dr. Kim-Prieto.



Kristy McCadden (Program Coordinator, Psychology) has made a career working in non profit / higher education administration. Prior to joining TCNJ's Psychology Department, she spent a decade+ working in social impact with undergraduate business students at the NYU Stern School of Business and two years at the University of Pennsylvania in Development and at the School of Veterinary Medicine.
