Independent Study (PHL 493, 495, 496) Steps:

- Send an email to Meyri, delossm1@tcnj.edu, showing your interest
- Fill out proposal form
- In conjunction with your professor, complete a proposal on what your project or Research/Thesis will be about
- Write an email to your professor with the completed form. In the email, ask your professor if they approve.
- They will write you back stating whether they approve or not.
- IF they approve, forward that email to the Chair of the Philosophy Department, Dr. Preti (preti@tcnj.edu)
- IF she approves, copy the entire email thread and save it as a document onto your hard drive or desktop (wherever).

Major Requirements

this Spring

PHL 100 – INTRO TO PHILOSOPHY

A course that examines the fundamentals of philosophical argument, analysis and reasoning, as applied to a series of issues in logic, epistemology, metaphysics and ethics. Topics covered may include: logical validity, theories of knowledge and belief, the nature of mind, the nature of reality, arguments for the existence of God, and theories of the nature of right and wrong.

PHL 120 – INTRO TO LOGIC

A course on the basic principles and techniques of correct reasoning in ordinary life and the sciences. Study of the formal systems of sentence logic and predicate logic. Translation of natural language statements and arguments and analysis and evaluation of deductive arguments through the construction of proofs. Focus particularly on the power and precision of the natural language with the aim of helping students increase their ability to think and write with creativity, precision and rigor.

PHL 205 – HISTORY OF MODERN PHILOSOPHY

A course tracing the development of major philosophical ideas in the West from the beginning of the 17th century to the close of the 18th century. Philosophers whose works are examined typically include some or all of: Descartes, Spinoza, Leibniz, Locke, Berkeley, Hume, and Kant. Special emphasis is placed on the development of epistemology and metaphysics during the Enlightenment

PHL 375 – LAW AND ETHICS

A seminar on the moral foundations of the law and the relation between law and ethics. In that connection, we explore utilitarianism and objections to that theory grounded in considerations of equality and in privacy. Readings for the course will come from both traditional and contemporary sources in moral philosophy and from Supreme Court and other court opinions.
